### Enhancing Access to Resources

Consortium of Ohio Libraries (COOL): Partnered with COOL to redevelop their budget model and implement and optimize COOL Aspen Discovery – improving resource accessibility for library users.

### Increasing Efficiency & Savings

Ohio Industrial Resource Cooperative (OIRC) - Utilized group negotiation to facilitate savings for corporate libraries.

Ohio Private Academic Libraries (OPAL) Consortium: Collaborated with OPAL to reimagine their membership model and continued working to transition to Alma.

Portage Library Consortium (PLC): Re-aligned and automated data loading and export processes to save time and reduce manual efforts.

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## Wellbeing in Ohio Libraries



Individuals from libraries across Ohio completed the PERMAH workplace wellbeing survey.

- Facilitated six virtual exploration sessions on the individual PERMAH factors to discover what members are already doing in their library to support wellbeing.
- Assisted an OhioNet member library with administering the workplace wellbeing survey at their organization and interpreting survey results.



## Key Programs & Initiatives

### ADEI Assessment & Dream Summit

In 2023, OhioNet commissioned an Anti-Racism, Diversity, and Inclusion (ADEI) Assessment to address the underrepresentation of BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, and People of Color) librarians in the state of Ohio – and the broader library and information science field.

The findings from this assessment and Dream Summit discussions (pictured above) will guide OhioNet in advancing antiracism practices through the development of new programs focused on improving BIPOC recruitment and retention in Ohio.

### Library Leadership Ohio

In partnership with the State Library of Ohio, OhioNet planned and hosted Library Leadership Ohio (LLO), a biennial leadership program for Ohio libraries. This year's cohort included 34 leaders from libraries of all types across the state.
